New Vice-Chancellor welcomed

The new Vice-Chancellor of the University of Oxford, Professor Andrew Hamilton, during his first visit to the Centre, welcomed its contributions to the academic life of the University.

Meeting with Fellows of the Centre, the Vice-Chancellor noted the multi-disciplinary range of their academic interests. Consideration was given to ways in which the Centre could support new areas of teaching and research within various faculties of the University.

Professor Hamilton expressed particular interest in the Centre's recent agreement with the University which now provides the context for expansion of the Centre's Scholarship Programme. This Programme, the details of which are given on the final page of this issue, awards scholarships to those accepted to read for degrees at Oxford. The Vice-Chancellor welcomed the potential of the Programme to support promising students from Britain's diverse Muslim communities, and also overseas students from Asia, Africa and the Middle East.

The visit also provided an opportunity for the Vice-Chancellor to visit the academic, social and residential facilities now being completed in the Centre's new building.

Diplomatic representatives to the United Kingdom from over twenty countries visited the Centre in December. Led by HE Mr Khalid Al-Duwaisan, Ambassador of Kuwait and Dean of the Diplomatic Corps, the delegation was received by the Lord Lieutenant of Oxfordshire and the Director.

Countries represented in the delegation included

Algeria, Bahrain, Egypt, Kuwait, Iraq, Morocco, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Sudan, Syria, Tunisia and Yemen.

Over the past two decades support from countries around the world has enabled the Centre to develop an international network of contacts with scholars and academic institutions. This has fostered the exchange of

> staff and enabled collaborative research to take place. The diplomatic delegation was shown the Centre's new building, currently under construction, which provides the academic, social and residential facilities for the future development of the Centre.

> During a lunch given in their honour there was a presentation of the Centre's academic achievements and future plans. This was followed by an open discussion in which individual members of the delegation welcomed the progress being made on this major new initiative.

Centre Fellow offers new course

Dr Adeel Malik, the Centre's Globe Fellow in the economies of Muslim societies, has introduced an option course in the political economy of the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) for Oxford University's MPhil in Development Studies programme. The course, which involves collaboration with the Oxford Energy Institute, will also be available as an option for students reading for the MPhil in Modern Middle Eastern Studies.

This new course will make an important contribution to teaching in Development Studies and Middle Eastern Studies. It will open new possibilities for Oxford's graduate students to conduct high-quality research on the political economy of Middle East and North Africa. The Centre is committed to developing new teaching and research opportunities with departments and faculties across the University.

Visiting Fellowship

Belgium

At the invitation of the European Commission's European Institute of Public Administration (EIPA), the Director presented two lectures in Brussels for their 'Islam Awareness Course'. The course paid special attention to Russia, the Caucasus,

and Central Asia, and considered such topics as the beliefs, practices, and faith dynamics of the Muslim world, and on sectarianism, schools of thought, and intellectual trends in Islam.

Seminar Series

'The Muslim World Today'

During Michaelmas Term the Centre held a series of seminars on the subject of 'The Muslim World Today'. Speakers considered specific facets of the modern Islamic world. They included Professor Anoush Ehteshami (University of Durham) on 'Security and Stability in the Gulf: The US, Iran, and GCC'; Professor George Joffé (University of Cambridge) on 'Reform and Change in North Africa'; Dr Rosemary Hollis (City University London) on 'Egypt, Jordan, and Peace in the Middle East'; Professor Avi Shlaim (St Antony's College, Oxford) on 'Israel and the Palestinians: A Hundred Years of Conflict'; Mr David Gardner (Financial Times) on 'Living with Islamists: The Implications of Change in the Middle East'; author Mr Robert Lacey on 'Inside the Kingdom: Challenges Facing Saudi Arabia'; and Mr Alexander Evans (Yale University) on 'Pakistan's Strategic Culture'.

A special seminar was given by Professor Abdallah Schleifer (Distinguished Professor, American University in Cairo) on 'The Common Word Open Letter: A Historic Breakthrough for Interfaith Dialogue'. He reviewed the Common Word Steering Committee's recent fourth meeting, 'A Common Word between Us and You: A Global Agenda for Change', in Georgetown, USA, which brought together representatives from the Muslim and Christian faiths to advance initiatives for peace.

Ditchley: 'The USA and the Muslim World'

The Centre hosted its annual conference at Ditchley Park during the weekend of 13–15 November. The subject of this year's conference was 'The United States and the Muslim World'.

Participants were drawn from a wide variety of backgrounds with professional and government experience in Western and Muslim countries. The conference examined the historical and contemporary aspects of the socio-economic, political, and cultural relationship between America and the broader Islamic world.

The range of subjects considered included: the need for greater recognition of the diverse traditions and aspirations within the Muslim World; the desirability of increased realization of the common ground between the values and aspirations of the United States and the Muslim World; and the need for the empowerment of Muslim societies so that these common values can be employed to build mutually beneficial consensus. Considerable attention was given to the different perceptions and policies of the Bush and Obama administrations and the opportunities for change in a decreasingly unipolar global political system in which there is no conscious disjuncture between human-rights rhetoric and security policy. There was also discussion regarding the American culture as a global 'brand' to which people in the Islamic world are drawn, despite their perception that America dislikes or is indifferent to them.

Royal College of Defence Studies

Democratization and Change in the Muslim World

The Centre organized a two-day workshop on 'Islam in the Modern World' for the Royal College of Defence Studies, London. It was attended by senior officers, from the three services, representing 35 countries as well the UK. Centre Fellows provided briefings on a number of themes relating to the social, political, and strategic challenges facing Muslims in the Islamic world and the West. These included presentations on 'Democratization and the Modern State' and 'United States and the Global Political Order'. The workshop is part of a larger course organized under the auspices of the UK Defence Academy. It is designed to give senior military officers, from the United Kingdom and overseas, opportunities to benefit from briefing and open discussion about issues concerned with global security.

Fifith Annual Summer School

The Centre will conduct its fifth annual summer school of the Young Muslim Leadership Programme. The Programme, which will be held at Wadham College, is organized jointly by the Centre and the Prince's Charities. The two-week residential course is for young British Muslim men and women who have shown leadership potential in their respective careers.

Strategy Advisory Committee meets

The Centre's Strategy Advisory Committee recently held a meeting at Clarence House, London. The purpose of the committee, which meets periodically, is to review and assist those Centre activities which have wider benefits for British society.
