

# Links with Indonesia Strengthened

## State visit of HE Dr Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono

On Wednesday 31 October, the Centre's Patron, His Royal Highness The Prince of Wales, hosted HE Dr Susilo Bambang Yudhoyono, President of the Republic of Indonesia, at Clarence House during the President's State Visit to the United Kingdom.

President Yudhoyono was given a briefing on the work of the Centre, its longstanding academic links with Indonesia and its broader interests in South East Asian studies.

Indonesian academics had spent time at the Centre and there had also been visits to Oxford by senior Indonesians from public life. Indonesian students had studied for degrees at the University of Oxford supported by the Centre's scholarships.

The importance of environmental policy in the Muslim world, and our Patron's lecture on "Islam and the Environment", were also topics of discussion.

President Yudhoyono also met the Centre's newly appointed Al Bukhari Fellow in the History of Islam in South East Asia and a graduate Centre Scholar from Indonesia.

## Unity not Uniformity in Modern India

## Lecture by India's Minister of Law

On Thursday 11 October the Centre hosted the Minister of Law and Minorities of India. For Mr Salman Khurshid it was an academic homecoming as he studied for his Bachelor of Common Law degree in Oxford and later taught law at Trinity College.

For his lecture, Mr Khurshid chose the topic of "Unity not Uniformity: The Politics of Modern India". He explained, from personal experience, how minority issues are managed in the Indian context and the challenges and opportunities involved. He argued that diversity was fundamental

to the richness of our societies and its protection was essential to successful social and economic development.

After the lecture Mr Khurshid was the guest at a dinner hosted by the Centre which was attended by many senior members of the Law Faculty of the University of Oxford.

Mr Khurshid also conducted a reading from his celebrated play "The Sons of Babur", which addresses, in dramatic form, elements of Muslim history in India. The reading was chaired by the Provost of Worcester, Professor Jonathan Bate.

The Centre congratulates its guest on his subsequent appointment as Minister of External Affairs.

#### CHCI Conference on Islam and the Humanities

In September the Centre co-hosted а two day conference with the Consortium of Humanities Centres and Institutes (CHCI) on the topic of "Islam and the Humanities". The Consortium of Humanities Centres and Institutes is an international membership group comprised of organizations devoted to humanities research, teaching and public engagement. Members of the CHCI International Advisory Board, scholars and leaders in the humanities from around the world attended the conference and discussed the major intellectual themes that occupy scholars in the Muslim world and the changing face of educational institutions.

#### Dr Scott Flower leads workshop at the Centre

Dr Scott Flower (OCIS Visiting Fellow) convened an international workshop on the Tablighi Jamaat between 14-18 October, co-sponsored by the Gerda Henkel and the Wenner-Gren Foundations.

Eighteen leading scholars discussed change and continuity within the world's largest transnational Islamic revivalist movement over the last decade.

The workshop linked up scholars in the field and fostered intergenerational exchange of information between senior and emerging scholars.

The workshop papers will result in a book to be published in 2013 and a new virtual network to facilitate future research collaboration.

# An Expanding Academic Programme

Annual Trustees Meeting at Ditchley Park

The Centre's Trustees held their annual meeting this year in September at Ditchley Park, Oxfordshire, to review the Centre's latest year of activity and to plan for the future. Their first stop was in Oxford to see the progress of work on the interiors of the new building. In their meetings they took a thorough look at the progress achieved by the Centre in all fields. They commended new appointments to the Fellowship and noted the continuing importance of the Scholarship programmes, which currently support 27 graduate and undergraduate students studying for degrees at Oxford.

The Trustees also reviewed the Visiting Fellowship and Publications programmes. A record number of academics from around the world would be in Oxford in the year ahead as Centre Visiting Fellows, participating in the academic life of the Centre and Oxford more widely. New publications were also planned and the Centre's Journal of Islamic Studies was attracting an ever wider readership.

Finally the Trustees looked ahead at future prospects for expansion of academic activity and discussed priority areas for the Centre's future research and teaching.
